2 Check In

- **Insurance coverage**

For your training period in Germany you will need an adequate insurance coverage (health insurance, liability insurance, accident insurance). You will be forced to take a DAAD insurance (see enclosed yellow paper).

Exceptions: You already needed to get an insurance in your country (e.g. Brazil,...).

You already have an insurance and made sure that coverage meets all requirements (at least the coverage of the DAAD insurance). In this particular case, we will need a signed confirmation or copy of the contract from you.

- **Registration (Anmeldung)**

You will have to register yourself within a week after your arrival at the town council ("Rathaus") in the registration office ("Einwohnermeldeamt"). For that, you will have to fill out a form and will have to bring it personally to the registration office. Do not forget to take your passport or your identity card with you.

- **Notice of departure (Abmeldung)**

Please fill in the enclosed form and leave the line "date of departure" unfilled. Give the form to an IAESTE member, who picked you up or bring it with you to the "Stammtisch". The "Stammtisch" is taking place in the bar "Pleitegeier" every Thursday 8pm.

- **Arrival confirmation**

For our statistics we will need your home address and your signature which proves that you have arrived in Erlangen.

- **Lodging**

We, the IAESTE LC Erlangen, have reserved a room for you. That is why you will have to either make your hire contract directly with the landlord or either with us. The rent for the first month has to be paid immediately when you arrive. You have to pay deposit for the room, which is 150 € on your arrival day, too. When you leave, without having damaged anything you will get back the deposit from an IAESTE member, shortly before your departure.

- **First working day**

Please inform yourself, already a day before your first day at work, where the company is, where you are working and how to get there in time.

- **Bank account**

In order to get money from the company for which you are working, you will need to open a bank account in most cases. This account can be opened at any bank (Sparkasse, Volksbank, etc.) Just simply go to a bank and tell them that you need a bank account. Do not forget to mention that you are a student (student identification card = "Studentenausweis") because as student you don't have to pay any service charges. Do not forget to close your bank account before your departure.

4 Germany

Some facts and figures

The Federal Republic of Germany is situated in the heart of Europe, surrounded by a total of nine neighbouring states. In terms of population it is the largest country in the European Union, in terms of area, the third largest. From North to South the distance is 876 km, from East to West more than 640 km. Due to its central position Germany functions within the EU and NATO as a bridge to the Central and Eastern European states and is an important location for European and global relations. 80 million people live in Germany, of whom 8.5 millions are foreigners. Germany has a temperate climate. In summer the temperature is about 18-20°C although in many places the thermometer can clamber over the 30°C mark, while in winter the mean temperature is about 1.5°C in the plains and -6°C in the mountains. Rain falls all year round, especially in autumn. The German landscape is extremely varied. The north is characterised by lakes, heath and moorland; the coast by chains of islands, estuaries and dunes. In the South the Swabian-Bavarian plateau with its hills and large lakes as well as the German part of the Alps are located. In the area in between there are deciduous and coniferous forests, slate hills and a green landscape or river valleys and plains.

More than half of the German people live in towns with a population of between 2 000 and 100 000. There are 85 larger towns and cities with more than 100 000 inhabitants spread throughout the country. Since the unification the capital and future seat of government is once again Berlin, with a current population of 3.5 millions. The towns can boast a lively, varied cultural scene. The right to artistic freedom is guaranteed as is the right to freedom of expression. The multifarious press organs and other mass media are not censored and guarantee a democratic control of the state and society. Germany's liberal-democratic constitution, the Basic Law, dates back to 1949. Since the Unification Treaty of 3rd October 1990 between the German Democratic Republic and the Federal Republic of Germany this constitution governs whole Germany.

Once upon a time the German people evolved from Germanic tribes like the Franks, Saxons, Swabians and Bavarians. Some elements of the old traditions and vernacular can still be found in the respective regions and express themselves in variations in mentality and very different dialects. However, as a result of massive post-war mass migration, the mobility of modern industrial society and, last but not least, the cultural enrichment brought about by the influx of foreigners, very few people can still be classified as absolutely typical. Germany is one of the most highly-industrialized and economically powerful countries in the world. The economic system is classed as a social market economy within which competition has become very pronounced. Unemployment is a problem, not only in the new federal states. The major sectors

of the economy are the manufacturing industry, service industries, trade and transport. Great political importance is attached to environmental protection which is a major concern of the people.

5 Erlangen

The small hamlet "erlangon" was mentioned documentarily for the first time in 1002. The enormous development of the settlement started in 1631 after Emperor Karl the IV aquired it and established the area today known as the "Altstadt". With the settlement of the Hugenotts, who were prosecuted in France for their religious believes, Markgraf Christian Ernst from Bayreuth introduced a new stage in the development of the town. The laying of the foundation stone took place in 1700. The Friedrich-Alexander University of Erlangen was founded in 1743. In 1844 the railroad was completed. Nevertheless, Erlangen remained a mid sized town until the end of World War II.

The change into an industrial town didn't occur until 1947, when the Siemens Schuckert Werke (now Siemens AG) moved it's headquarters from Berlin to Erlangen. Later, a huge research centre was set up. Today, products are developed and manufactured in many fields including medicine technology, microelectronics, transport technology and the technology of powerplants.

Along with the industrial growth, the population more than doubled, from 45 000 in 1947 to a todays amount of 100 000. Students make up a large part of this figure, amounting today to about 30 000. In order to relieve the traffic congestion, bike paths have been bulit, making it possible to reach every spot in the city comfortably within 15 minutes. For the less energetic busses run frequently and if your destination is further away, travelling by train is also a possibility.

A diverse range of culture is offered including various museums or theatres. Musical performances occur fairly regularly and during summer artists and performers of all kinds can be found in the pedestrian zones.

Evenings can be spent nicely in lively pubs, chatting over a glass of beer. Nothing, however, can be compared to the "Bergkirchweih", which is a well known beer festival. It takes place every year during the week of Whitsun and it is a must. As you can see, Erlangen has plenty to offer. Enjoy your stay and take as much out of it as you can.

6 Nuremberg

Nuremberg was founded in 1040 by Emperor Heinrich III as a military support area for the stabilization of the east Franconian area. It can definitely not be counted as one of the oldest towns in Franconia, but has played an important role over the years as a trading and craft centre. In those days Nuremberg lay

at the crossing point of important trading paths, which led from Black Sea to Spain and from England to Italy. Starting points for oversea trade were for example Lisbon, Antwerp and Venice. The Nuremberg craftsmen guild played an important role as early as the thirteenth century, also by exporting genuine products. Everything from metal working to technical inventions and scientific discoveries such as the first pocket watch (Peter Henlein) or the first globe (Martin Behaim) can be associated with the history of Nuremberg. In 1835, the "Adler", the first train in Germany went from Nuremberg to Fürth. Nuremberg was also home of many artists. Among them are the wood carver Veit Stoß(1447-1533), the sculptor Adam Kraft (1450-1509), the ore founder Peter Vischer (1460-1529) and the painter Albrecht Dürer (1471-1528). At the end of the middle ages, there were a few Emperors with residence in Nuremberg. Nuremberg took up a special position among German cities as an "imperial city" with its own custom and tax laws. After the prime of its trade and craft guild in the 16th and 17th century, Nuremberg lost a lot of its significance when it was made part of Bavaria by Napoleon in 1806. Apart from the time of the "Third Reich", when the "Reichsparteitage" were held in Nuremberg, the town didn't play any important political role. Today Nuremberg has about 500 000 inhabitants and is home to practically all branches of industry and economy. In particular the metal working industry and mechanical engineering. The town's exhibition centre hosts a wide variety of trade fairs every year, including the only toy fair in the world. Other object of interest are the "Nürnberger Tiergarten", the zoo in the east of Nuremberg (one of the older and most beautiful ones), and the many museums. Among them the Documentation Centre Nazi Party Rally Grounds, dealing with the causes relationships and consequences of National Socialist tyranny.

7 FAQs

Frequently Asked Questions

- **What should I know about public transport?**

We distinguish a regional and a long-distance system. Long distances are served by the "Deutsche Bahn" (DB). Regional transportation in Nuremberg, Erlangen and its surrounding is operated by the VGN. In other cities there are similar linked transport systems.

- **Which VGN ticket is right for me?**

The region is divided into zones which determine the prize. The ticket is valid for all the public transportation. You can use buses, trains (only SE, RB and RE-trains!) and in Nuremberg also tram and underground. Changing between subways, buses and trains is possible within a certain time in one direction without buying a new ticket. Tickets can be bought at VGN-offices or in many bus-stops at ticket-vending machines. If you want to buy a ticket from the bus driver you can only get the expensive single-ticket. As a student you can get a student-tariff for monthly-cards. Buy your ticket from the driver or from the ticket-vending machine, if you need the bus, train or underground only occasionally. For frequent use of public transportation the purchase of a "5er-Streifenkarte" ("5 stripes card") is cheaper (valid only in Erlangen). If you want to go from Erlangen to Nuremberg or vice versa you should use the "10er Streifenkarte" and have to stamp 4 stripes. In any case you are not allowed to use "10er Streifenkarte" for journeys within Erlangen. If you look up your connection online (www.vgn.de), you'll also get information about the amount of stripes needed. If you need public transportation daily then it is useful to buy a Mobicard or a Monthlycard ("Monatskarte" = cheaper). At your arrival, you received an application for a Monthlycard. You can get detailed information at the VGN-offices or at the railway stations. You can also ask an IAESTE member at "Pleitegeier" on thursdays.

- **Where do I get information about DB connections**

Ask at the information office at the railway station, call "Deutsche Bahn-Ticketauskunft" at 01805-996633 or have a look at www.bahn.de. You can also get all itinerary information and tickets at the DB ticket machines. Normal tickets are valid within two days. There are many reductions:

- **Bahncard25** costs 50€ and gives you a 25% reduction on the normal prize. **Bahncard50**: costs 100€ and gives you a 50% reduction on the normal prize. The reduction can be extended to up to five travellers.

- **Plan& Spar 25:** if you purchase a two-way ticket at least 3 days prior to your journey you can possibly save 25% on the normal prize. However there is a restricted amount of tickets, valid on one specific connection, only. **Plan& Spar 50:** 50% off on very restricted amount of tickets at same conditions as Plan & Spar 25, but not within Mo-Fr of the same week.
- **Bayern Ticket:** valid from Mon. - Fri. 9 am - 4 pm and 6 pm - 3 am. for 5 travellers within Bavaria on regional trains (S, RB, RE, IRE): 22€. **Bayern Ticket Single:** same for a single traveller: 15€.
- **Schönes-Wochenende-Ticket:** for 5 travellers on regional trains in Germany (S, RB, RE, IRE): 30€(28€at any ticket-vending-machine.)

There are other reductions, (e.g. on night-trains), too. If you are planning to do several longer journeys, ask an IAESTE member for advice about what kind of reductions there are.

- **How to travel cheaper than by train.**

There's another extremely cheap possibility to travel to big german cities by a special share-a-ride-service ("Mitfahrzentrale"). This service is offered in many cities, where they arrange lifts. This is a good alternative to the Deutsche Bahn. For more information about share-a-ride you can ask at the office in Nuremberg:

Alternatively you might also consider renting a car.

- **How do I get a bicycle?**

We have a limited amount of bikes. You can rent a bike at a bicycleshop, as well.

If you stay longer, you should consider buying a cheap one at the flea market (starting from about 30 €).

- **Where do I get information about events, discos, theatre?**

In many pubs and cafes there are magazines free of charge, which will give you an overview about cultural events in the region. The most important magazines are:

Doppelpunkt, Hugo, filmtips, E-Werk Programm, fifty-fifty, curt, ...

- **Should I give tip in restaurants, bars, ...?**

Here, people usually round the sum up to the next .0 or .5 value. A tip of about 10% is common.

- **How and where can I phone?**

Most of the telephones are working only with a telephone card or a calling card (cheaper for long-distance/international calls). Telephone cards can be bought at all "Telekom"-shops. Calling cards for example in Friedrichstr. and Goethestr. in Erlangen or in Nuremberg at the train station (underground - passage towards city, exit Koenigstr). If you have a telephone where you stay, you can save a lot of money with "call by call" (see www.telefontarife.de or www.billigertelefonieren.de).

- **Can I use my mobile phone or can I get one in Germany?**

If you come from a European country, your mobile should work. In any other case, contact your dealer. Most mobile-contracts in Germany have a 24-month runtime, therefore the only possibility for you, to get a mobile is to use a prepaid system. For more information ask at any O2, D1, D2 or Eplus store here in Germany.

- **How can I write a letter?**

If you want to write a letter you have to distinguish between three possibilities:

- Germany & Europe: Letter 0,55 €- Postcard 0,45 €
- out of Europe: Letter 1,50 €- Postcard 1,00 €
- by Air Mail: Letter 1,50 €- Postcard 1,00 €

Please note, that the fastest way is by Air Mail, but therefore you should mark your letter with "Luftpost". Another point to mention is, that these prices are only valid for letters with a maximum weight of 20g which is about three pages.

- **How do I get my monthly salary?**

If you are paid by the company where you are working, then the company will transfer you the money. For that you should open a bank account. When you are paid by the IAESTE (e.g. if you are working for the university) you will be paid at the weekly "Stammtisch" meetings at "Pleitegeier". In this case your rent will be deducted from your salary. Other trainees who are paid by their company have to pay their rent each month there.

- **How can I open a bank account?**

Go to a bank (e.g. Sparkasse, Volksbank, Dresdner Bank, Deutsche Bank, Post Bank, etc.) take your ID and student ID with you. Everything will be told by the clerk at the bank. Notice! The banks are open only from 8.30 a.m. until 4 p.m. See also section "Check In".
